A Quick Guide to Open Educational Resources (OERs)

What are OERs?



FREELY AVAILABLE

Most are legal to copy, adapt, and redistribute semester after semester.



OPEN

"Open" means openly licensed, meaning they are in the public domain or the copyright holder has abridged rights to eliminate barriers to access/use/derivative works.



CC LICENSED

Often contains a creative commons license. Check each resource for use rights. creativecommons.org/licenses

Why are OERs and other types of affordable content important?



Course materials are freely available on the **FIRST DAY OF CLASS**

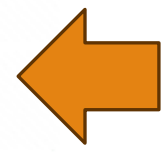

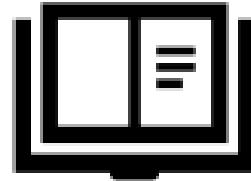


A quick guide to OERs



What is the Open Educational Resources (OER)?

- Open access
- Open format
- Open license
- Open software



Learning, teaching, and research materials in any format and medium that reside in the public domain or are under the copyright that has been released under an open license, that permits no-cost access, re-use, re-purpose, adaptation, and redistribution by other
(UNESCO, 2012).

What is a good OER?

- Findable – it can be in multiple locations
- Clearly described
- Clearly licensed (normally through Creative Commons)
- From a source you trust
- Easy to modify
- Free-standing – it does not assume knowledge of other resources
- Free of copyright content
- Being used by/recommended by people like you
- Imperfect – it just needs to work for you

What can be defined as OERs?

Components of OER

Material type	Openly licensed	Freely available	Modifiable
Open educational resources	✓	✓	✓
Free online resources under all rights reserved copyright	X	✓	X
Materials available through the University Library	X	✓	X
Open Access articles and monographs	✓	✓	✓/X



What are the 5 Rs of OERs?

The 5Rs stand for:

- Retain
- Revise
- Remix
- Reuse
- Redistribute

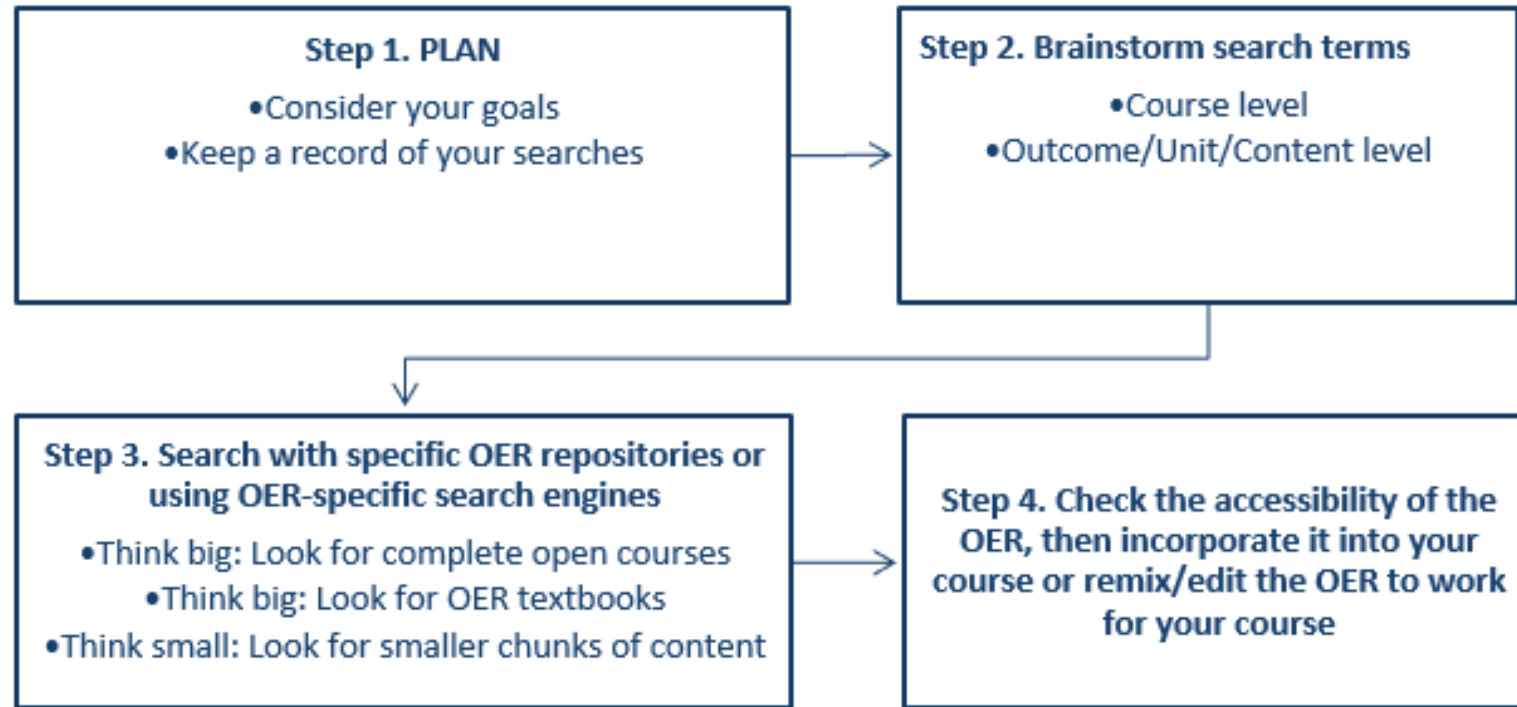

Search tools

Title	Website	Short description
OASIS	https://oasis.geneseo.edu/	a federated search tool designed to streamline the process of finding open content. At present, it scours through 115 diverse sources, aggregating a total of 440,380 records for your convenience.
MERLOT	https://www.merlot.org/merlot/advSearchMaterials.htm	A federated search tool, widely renowned as a prominent hub for discovering and exchanging educational resources, offers a vast array of teaching materials. It's important to note that not all materials are openly accessible. To locate resources with Creative Commons licenses, utilize the advanced search feature.
The Mason OER Metafinder	https://oer.deepwebaccess.com/oer/desktop/en/search.html	A federated search tool provides an extensive collection of open content, encompassing open-access books and articles, documents in the public domain, and open educational resources (OER).
